#### **GOOGLE VOICE**

Are you paying \$25.00 per month to AT&T for their Unlimited Nation-wide calling? Or their \$0.05 per minute at a subscription rate of \$5.00 per month? Or better still, their a-la-carte rate of \$0.12 per minute? Maybe you call Canada. AT&T will let you have unlimited minutes for the monthly subscription fee of \$5.99. In my case we call South Korea for \$0.10 per minute using prepaid calling cards.

Let me tell you how you can get these services for dead free. Yes, free, as in no money at all. All you need is an existing phone with a touch tone dialer and access to a computer for about 10 minutes.

First make sure you have an email account. Google mail is great. It seems to be always up, they give you lots of space and the spam filtering is excellent. I don't think I've seen a spam message in 6 months get through. But I'm pretty sure any valid email account will work.

Next, go to <a href="http://voice.google.com">http://voice.google.com</a> and login, by following the prompts.

You must then select a number to use as your Google number. It could be any number you want in any area code that you want, but to make long distance dialing free, you'll need to select one that is local to your landline. Once you've done that, you must link your new Google number to a number that you already own. In our example it would be your home landline, but it could be your business or cell phone numbers too. You can link many numbers if you want to. You can link your work number, your home number, the number in your second home, your cell phone number or any other number that you answer frequently. This way, a caller can reach you no matter where you are, because all those phones will ring at the same time. The others will stop when you answer one of them.

Once you have everything setup on the web, you can make free long distance phone calls to any U.S. number including Hawaii and Alaska. You can also call Canada at no charge. You don't need to worry about the time of day and it doesn't have to be a night or weekend. You can also call overseas at very inexpensive rates. In my case, a call to a South Korea landline is \$0.02 per minute instead of the \$0.10 per minute that AT&T is offering me.

Remember, you don't have to use a computer to use the Google Voice service, but there is a lot that a computer can make more interesting and useful.

For example, if someone leaves a voice message on your Google number, Google will transcribe it and put it in your email box, so you'll have a written record of it. It's not perfect, but it gets the point across. You'll need a computer to view that transcription.

I want to be clear that I'm not an employee of Google or affiliated with them in any way. I just think their Google Voice service is a great value and I wanted to share it with you. Heck, I'll bet that PPMC, Inc. could save a pretty penny by switching over to them. I believe they will be offering the service for a while and have larger plans in mind. Google reserved one million U.S. phone numbers in 2009. They also paid \$125 million in acquiring the underlying technology.

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#### WHITE REDWOOD TREES

While vacationing in the Big Sur area a few days ago Carol and I were quite surprised to come across a rare Albino Redwood tree. It was located in the Fernwood RV Park a couple of miles north of Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park.



White redwood trees, also called Albino Redwood, is a parasite plant that attaches itself to the root structure of a host redwood tree. Such are genetic mutations that lack the necessary chlorophyll that would enable them to capture the suns rays and convert the energy of the sun to food. The lack of chlorophyll prevents its leaves from turning green. The redwood leaves (feathers) have an ivory color while living, but when dead they become as brown as any usual redwood feather. The shape and appearance of white redwood trees is more like that of a bush than that of a tree, and the one we saw, although fully mature, was only about six feet tall. There are less than 24 known Albino Redwood trees in the world, and all are located in our Pacific coastal range reaching from Humboldt to Monterey. The pictures we took of the white redwood near Big Sur didn't turn out well, as it was in deep shade and the tree was covered with campground dust, so I attached an internet picture of a similar tree located in Humboldt County to give you an idea as to its appearance.

# MANAGING YOUR MONEY - #1 INTRODUCTION

This column, that I hope will be a regular one in the PIP, is intended to help Members of PPMC to effectively manage their money. Many individuals concentrate their money management efforts on their savings or investment money. While doing this they overlook the effective use of credit cards, checking accounts, etc. My objective is to show you how to manage <u>all</u> your money.

I know that many of you depend upon others to help you manage your money. Those that do are probably paying for this service. I hope that I can show you that all of us are capable of managing our own money. Certainly we have the greatest vested interest in successfully growing and preserving our own money.

I know that for most, discussing finance is about as interesting as watching paint dry. I hope that I can present this material in a simple and interesting manner. You had a taste of the tools of finance if you read my column I wrote about "Maximizing CD Income" in the May 2010 issue. I would encourage the readers to ask questions and add their own ideas. I would like that to be a second column. I am also available to any Member that has questions.

Before one can use the various financial tools, you need to understand them. I will start out by explaining these tools and how they can be used in the scheme of managing your There was a very famous and successful mutual fund manager named Peter Lynch. He managed the Fidelity Magellan Fund from 1977 to 1990. During that time the fund grew from \$20 million to \$14 billion. Under his management the fund had an average return of 29%. Now that I have established that he knew what he was doing, I will give you one if his most important secrets to success. He said, "Never invest in anything you do not understand". That is why I am starting this column by teaching you the tools of the financial trade.

Please understand that I will be speaking from my own personal experience and will be discussing the financial tools that I know and have been effective for me. There will be many tools that I will not be discussing because I have not found them to be appropriate for you and me. I encourage the reader to bring other tools up for discussion and would be happy to discuss them at that time but I think you will find it hard to convince me that they are appropriate for us.




