

### BUTTER

By Cupcake

Have you given "butter" any thought? Well. I have. Ahhhh. sweet cream butter. REAL butter. There's really nothing like it, although many imposters try, and some would have you believe that there are other spreads that compare----it's simply not true. But alas, I am a confessed "butter snob". I don't settle, unless circumstances beyond my control dictate, for just any ole cube-cut, paper wrapped, annatto colored something. NO! There are butters, and then there are REAL butters. The kind that, when added to a warm mound of mashed potatoes or a fresh stack of piping hot flap jacks, adds the perfect wetness and slightly...... well, ".butterv" flavor that makes one's mouth water and fill with comfort: bite after luscious bite. The kind that when chunked onto a nice tear of warm sourdough bread, softens to just the right consistency that every bite brings forth the yeast and the savory.

The problem with your typical storebought butter today is, as many things, mass produced. By that I mean to say that there are fillers, such as water, salt and colorings. Yes, it's true. Additionally, the butter powers that seem to be, believe that the consumer requires cubes, and a brighter color than that of natural butter.

Side bar: how many "square" measuring cups have you ever seen?



Anyway, as I was saying, by law, US butter must contain a minimum of 80% butterfat. Small batch butters usually contain a butterfat content of somewhere around 86%. The higher butterfat gives the butter more flavor and better texture, which makes pie crusts flakier among other nice things.

Also, there is the "salt" consideration. Many small batch butters contain only a modicum of salt, which acts as a preservative. Mass produced butters contain larger amounts. Some would say that the salt adds the flavor, but I would say that they have never tasted true REAL butter.

In Santa Cruz, I have found McClelland's Artisan Organic butter. This is a "small batch" made butter that is produced in the hills of Sonoma County by a family-owned dairy that raises their own award winning cows. Just last year their cow, Lily, won Grand Champion and Best Udder of the Holstein Show in the California State Fair! Their butter has also won accolades; Double gold winner at the 2011 Sonoma County Harvest Fair, 3rd place winner in the nation at the American Cheese Society conference.

You can find McClelland's at Whole Foods and New Leaf Markets in Santa Cruz and Capitola. For baking, I find Plugra brand to be of good quality and taste. It is not organic, but is made in the traditional European style, with less water, and a higher butter fat content, so it, too, has a good "butter" flavor, and moves around a warm piece of bread well.

The gist of it is, when considering one of life's small guilty comfort pleasures; if you are going to slather anything at all on your precious pastry, or fresh warm bread, it should be of the highest quality and flavor one can afford one's self during such indulgences.

Now go out and set yourself up for a treat with a fresh loaf of that wonderful crusty chewy soft warm sourdough bread, and a crock of small batch made artisan buttery butter. Give it try and remember that I told you so!.....and then practice restraint.

### Minutes of July 23 BOD Meeting

Remember the following is based on what I observed and heard at the Board Meeting. For exact wording, please read the official minutes published in the monthly Bulletin

Forty-four people were in attendance with 20 of those who attend Tuesday Coffee. The meeting opened with a beautiful invocation given by Sharon Simas, which was then followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Diana Cook.

Griff Nelson was the first to speak during the Open Forum and he remarked on the divisiveness of the Park, staking issues, reserve fund, rentals, licensed realtors selling park improvements and cautioned the Board to ensure committees only report to the Board.

Bill Lind spoke on the water pressure and water flow project which the County had targeted for 2009, but I believe he said the county has postponed this project until 2015. So our water pressure and water flow will remain the same.

Mark Zevanove stated that Bob Morgan is in the hospital recovering from surgery.

It was moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the open board meeting of May 21. Karen Eneboe and Pat Herzog objected because Sharon Simas was referred to as "Presdent" and they felt she should be referred to as "acting" President because she was not "elected" to the office. Time was wasted discussing that issue. The Board approved the minutes as written. When the next set of minutes, June 18, 2011 were discussed, the same objections were raised. (Remember when President Kennedy was shot and then died, there was not an election held to have LBJ step in as President. That's why there IS the office of Vice President.)



Next order of business was the Director's Spotlight Award which was given to me. I was tickled pink. Thank you!

Manager - PG&E has almost completed both of the projects of trimming trees in the Park. The small Brush removal is complete except for the Entrance portion of Keystone. They have stopped work on it due to concerns of wood being left behind in the repairing corridor. The Large project mainly along The Royal Arch is complete except for the removal of one tree which is going through the approval process within PG&E. This Group has other projects slated for the park but they too are in the approval process as will.

The wood chips from the large project I had the dump them at the Picnic grounds and Eduardo is in the process of spreading them around the grounds.

We have a number of Redwood trees in the picnic Grounds that are in need of trimming. I have asked Richard's Trees service for an estimate on removing the hazard. He counted 40 trees in the area and priced the whole area at \$6,000.00. Our Annual Budget is \$7,000.00 for account number 6224.00 Tree Trimming/ Maintenance. I would like the Board's approval on this expenditure.

We recently had a trip and fall on The Royal Arch where a member had trip over storm grate. I had Eduardo make a new collection book with an opening that fit the grate. The line out of the box was also cleaned out. Eduardo also made a collection box for another drain on Washington walk way. This was a new box where we have a drain pipe and drain line leading to it just no collection box so that the drain pipe was all silted up and rooted, the drain pipe is now cleaned and all and should work fine during the winter.

For those who think the modern day Manager has it a lot easier than Manager of days gone by because of the new water lines. This may or may not be true because Eduardo replace two water valves, fixed a linking pipe and repaired a broken water line, sounds just like the good old days.

Last month the Board established a new policy to require all guests, be it a family member or a friend who is living in a member's improvement without the collective member present must go through Orientation. Some Orientation have already

been completed others have been setup and Annie is working on setting up a time for other but we have not heard back from a few we knew about and were sent letters. Tim Heer, Interim Manager

President's Report – Sam thanked all who voted for him and said he hoped to restore harmony, respect and objective business practices.

Gary Brandenburg also thanked all who voted for him and he stated he would work hard for peace and harmony in the Park. He is on a learning curve, having spent a lot of time with Pat McDonald. He reported there was an audit last week and some financial items he reported were \$60,4l4.74 in our checking account and \$226,017.90 in the savings account. They are looking at ways to get more interest on our cash. The \$68,000 from ComCast may be invested with a stock broker.

Staking – moved to approve updated staking log

Recreation —discussed bringing bocce courts up to standard by purchasing crushed oyster shell topping each winter. 300# costs about \$16/100#.

Bylaws- moved to add the names of Jim Barbera and Pat Herzog as committee members and Pat McDonald as liaison. M/S/P Moved that Bob Morgan's recommendations be sent to the Bylaws Committee for discussion. M/S/P...next meeting is Saturday, July 30 at 10 a.m. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Orientation – Gary and his wife went through this training and said it was a good learning session.

Picnic Grounds – Jim Clark – most painting is completed. Need a really good turnout for the Labor Day function as it may take about \$16,000 to complete. Sign up for the dinner in the office.

ERT – 5 911 calls 2 inside and 3 outside Volunteers In Prevention Committee ...need 4-6 people in each section

Ad hoc committes all have met...blue ribbon committee has come up with substantial findings.....dog park committee

meets at 2 p.m. today Fine schedule review committee has met a couple of times

Mediation Committee – moved to appoint Karen Eneboe to mediation committee. M/S/P

New Business – research into Skype for teleconferencing. Interim Manager Tim Heer reported that Skype requires a lot of expensive hardware. When asked how much is "expensive," Interim Manager Heer replied that he did not follow up on that as he didn't think there was enough money in the budget. Current phone system can handle up to 3 lines for phone conference call

Tree committee recommendations that tree be trimmed in accordance with arborists recommendation at allotment #430

New Business – boundary markers – John Mancini asked the board to direct John Densem to verify the permanent markers that John Mancini and Paul Mancini put on their allotment. Discussion tabled.

Gary Brandenberg moved that the board adopt Robert's rules of order as their parliamentary authority. Heated and lively discussion ensured with the result that Gary Brandenberg withdrew his motion.

Jim Cook, Billy Uber and one other man carried on a disruptive conversation in the back of the hall and Greg Laskey asked them to take their discussion outside. They quieted down.

The Open Forum last night was a very positive experience. Notes from the meeting are shown on the following page of this issue of the PIP. Gayle Logan Silva was concerned that Park paid for services that did not have board approval. Others didn't like the time as they did not think it was convenient. Jim Cook suggested a town hall meeting once a quarter. These meetings will continue on the Friday prior to the Board meeting for the next 3 months or so and then perhaps a quarterly meeting will be held.

The meeting adjourned around 12:30.
