Can a seemingly polarized living community be de-polarized?

The focus of this article is to suggest that groups that appear to be diametrically opposed are sometimes closer together than they think. Considering our present circumstances, can an examination and understanding of that which separates us bring us closer together?

As a presumption on my part I suggest that a comprehensive study of the true nature of opposites and opposition in our muchconflicted world would find that perceived underlying differences are not differences at all, but instead are similarities. As with contemporary political campaigns which command our present day attention, we are convincingly led by the media to believe that political opponents are diametrically opposed in all that they say and do. And yet, when individually challenged, each candidate will be found to have as his underlying purpose the improvement of our American way of life. Fostered by a news-hungry media, the rhetoric comes fast and furious and focuses on that which separates the opponents rather than that which finds them alike.

Using public politics as an appropriate example, a comparison can be made to the private politics that are currently surfacing fast furiously polarized and in our community. It is my contention that we are not polarized because of deep-rooted diametrically opposed beliefs, but because of surface tensions. One group seeks to control all that happens in the Park, and the other group takes exception to their effort to control,

and the fight is on - - e.g. one group sponsors a candidate they can control and the other group sponsors a candidate no one can control - - you recall our Director and we'll recall your Director - - you make me look bad and I'll make you look bad - - one group proposes legislation and the other group opposes it, not because it is bad legislation but because of DOH (didn't originate here).

So, using the example of public politics and the underlying concordance between opponents, what is the basic, undisputable, underlying concordance that unites all us here in the Park? Simply stated, we all want the improvement of our Paradise Park way of life. That concordance is unchallenged as it is abundantly clear that no one has ill will at heart when it comes to preserving our beautiful community.

So, if there isn't an underlying difference which is causing the polarization, then what is it that separates us and causes the strife. Do you remember playing "King-of-the-Hill" as a child? Well, that game is being played out in our community - - you knock me off the hill and I knock you off the hill until only one survives and remains standing. It is, to this writer's belief, the "control-factor" which lies just barely beneath the surface of every dispute that exists between the groups. Some want to be King - - others oppose their desire for control.

Now, the most astute question that has been heard lately is - - what is there to control? We all want Directors who will enforce

the Bylaws and Rules. We all want our infrastructure maintained. We all want peace and harmony in the Park. So, why isn't our community united in backing candidates who will take care of our Park rather than backing candidates that can be controlled with backroom politics? It truly does not make sense -- unless some members are still childishly hanging onto their game of King-of-the-Hill.

Another astute question that was heard recently was - - so why don't we let them be in control - - there is a lot of work involved - - let them do it if they are so anxious to do it. The resounding answer that was heard was that experience has shown that with control those in power practice favoritism and privilege, and do not apply the Bylaws and Rules evenhandedly. Those factors are deal-breakers - - no fairness - - no deal.

Is there a solution to the polarization? I suggest that the solution rests with communicating and ironing out our differences.

There was a recent "failed" attempt at bringing the two groups together to talk, and that failure was a real disappointment. An acknowledged and well respected leader in our community played the role of emissary and carried a message that a leader of one group had expressed an interest in getting together to talk. That olive branch was picked up by the opposing group and a message was sent, through the emissary, with a list of topics to be discussed and a list of participants that would be acceptable. The result was silence. Maybe the originator was insincere, or maybe he didn't like the proposed list of participants, or perhaps for some other reason chose not to respond, so for whatever reason the matter was dropped and the war goes on.

So, where do we go from here? I'll make the same proposal that came from the other side, in the same words that were used - - "Wouldn't it be great if we could just get together and talk?" OK, Mr. Emissary, you are welcome to carry this message and let's se if the opposition will come forward with their own list of delegates and their own list of subjects

that need to be addressed. That would be a good starting point.



Will this olive branch be picked up? Who knows - - but I think it certainly is worth a try.

PPMC Gate Watch By Dick Lovelace

January 1, 2012

To increase community awareness of the recent problems of break-ins and thefts in Paradise Park a gate watch at the front gate was set up for Sunday, January 1, 2012 from 12:01 AM until 11:59 PM.

Volunteers manned the front gate in shifts, stopping every vehicle entering the park. They recorded the time, license plate, name of the driver, allotment number destination in the park, and if the vehicle had a PPMC sticker the sticker number was noted. The drivers and passengers were advised of the reasons for the gate watch and also encouraged to be alert to unusual or suspicious activity in the park and to report any such activity to the Sheriff's Department and to the park office.

During the 24 hour period 270 vehicles entered the park via the front gate. A large number of these were visitors to the park. Of the 270 vehicles, 93 of them had park stickers.

More detailed data will be prepared and supplied to the park manager and the board of directors.

I want to thank all of the volunteers who gave up part of their New Year's Day to assist in this effort. I would also like to thank all of the park members and visitors who were very cooperative and stated their willingness to assist in raising awareness and to participate in the security of the park for the benefit of all.

The volunteers are to be commended and I would like to recognize them here. If you participated and I somehow left you off of this list, please accept my apologies and do let me know because everyone of you did a great service for our park.


Fable of the Porcupine

Fruit - when/how to eat

What is the correct way to eat fruit? It means not eating fruit after a meal. Fruit should be eaten on an empty stomach.

Arlene quickly walked to Lynn Raadik's house about 150 feet beyond the bridge and informed Lynn of the bridge accident so she could make a proper timely call. Arlene was able to borrow a pencil and piece of paper from one of the motorists before quickly writing the accident information.

What I think happened was the driver of the truck got his front left tire into the pedestrian lane. Then the driver applied more and more pressure by turning the steering wheel to the right in an attempt to get his truck back into the driving lane. When enough pressure was applied and

the tire griped the divider the truck made a quick turn to the right hitting the bridge.

Sam and Margo Glassey had a house on the river by where Mr. Butler at 159 St. Victor is now. The river decided to take the house down the river. The Park moved the house to its present location at 107 Keystone.

The family behind our house was the Stocklands at 111 Keystone. Roger and Thelma Coit bought the house next to 140 St. Alan from the people named Ekis (I think.)

The Watkins family lived at 138 St. Alban where their daughter Ruth Johnson lives now. The Gustufsons were at 134 St. Alban where their daughter lives now.

Most of the ladies belonged to the Knitting Kittens and they really **DID** knit, as well as crochet, embroider and they DID have a canasta group also.

My three sisters and I when we were all here to gather as well as others went to the Saturday night dances – walked up and back.

124 Keystone was home to "andy" (must have been Mr. Anderson.) He built a stair from the house down to the river, put in a rock dam, a raft and a rope from a tree to swing over the river and drop off. Much fun!

I don't remember Pot Lucks, Section Parties or a 4th of July parade.

At 114 Keystone was the home of Sam and Elsie Harris and my future husband Sam Jr. The house sold eventually and Elsie built the house at 133 St. Albans about 1948 after Sam and I (Charlsie) married. Elsie later married Bruce Hogue a local businessman. She was one of the first women on the Board of Directors.

I think the most I remember is the feeling of freedom and togetherness that seemed to prevail among the residents. Everyone seemed to be out going and ready to give what they could in the way of help, and willing to share if needed. An open communication between the Board and the residents.

This is still the best place in the USA and if possible I would make this my permanent home!



Since that trip Om has always wanted to return to Assisi. After all we have been through, we both deserved a treat. And what a treat it was!

When we arrived in Rome, the streets were covered with Christmas lights, and Italians have a very special knack with lights that surpasses anything I'd ever encountered. Last trip we saw Bernini's Daphne and Apollo, but this trip Val took us to his Ecstasy of S. Teresa. Then we traveled North and visited the Roman Ruins of Carsulae. According to Val (who is Roman) the ancient Romans did two things better than anyone...they built roads and baths --- that still exist today. The high point of the trip for me was spending the Winter Solstice soaking in an ancient thermal bath in Tuscany.

What is impossible to describe about Italy in words and pictures are the tastes and sounds of Christmas in Assisi, but I'll try.

I'll start with the tastes... Italians love food, and they love to eat. While eating breakfast they talk about lunch, while eating lunch they discuss plans for dinner. While eating dinner they talk

about tomorrow's breakfast. The food is always fresh, either hand-picked at the open air market or small neighborhood grocery. Meals are multi-coursed meals including huge salads drenched in fresh-pressed olive oil, hearty soups, steamed artichokes, porcini mushrooms, spinach/chicory and soft-cheese ravioli, polenta and beans (or spicy spaghetti), baked potatoes and onions, aged cheese with homemade bread, persimmons and pistachios, wild apples and plums with honey-stuffed croissants...get the picture?

Then the sounds...we attended Christmas Eve Vespers sung Franciscan monks at the chapel site where St. Francis received his first Divinely-inspired instructions, and where St. Claire lived cloistered with her original Poor Nuns. We attended a Christmas-Day concert in a centuries-old church (with superb acoustics) performed by a cello, viola, violin and flute accompanying a lovely soprano who sang classical hymns and modern carols. And we listened repeatedly to the myriad of church bells that faithfully toll the hours, everywhere we went, from downtown Rome to the sacred mountain of Assisi, Mt. Subasio.

We staved Val's on property. coincidentally named Paradiso, just 8 kilometers outside the city, directly across from Mt. Subasio. We walked from Mt. Subasio to Assisi again after 20 years! Nothing much had changed. The caves where the first Franciscan brothers sat for meditation still dot the hillside. The Basilica of St. Francis with it's teaching murals by Giotto on the top floor, paintings by Cimabue on the main floor, and the relics of the humble Saint's tomb in the basement, has survived many wars and also earthquakes. And the stories of St. Francis and St. Claire of Assisi (S. Francesco and S. Chiarra) continue to inspire pilgrims today. Their humble lives of dedication, compassion, contemplation, service, and poverty still draw people to Assisi from all over Italy and the world.

Legislature Targets Board Actions by E-Mail

It is very common for board members to communicate with each other and with management via email, and this is often the preferred method of communication on HOA issues. For some time there were no explicit statutory prohibitions or restrictions on the use of emails by board members to discuss or even take action on HOA business, but there is as of January 1, 2012 when Senate Bill 563 goes into effect. One of SB 563's major impacts will be to ban board "action" via email except in an emergency situation and, in that situation, all board members must unanimously consent to the action in writing (this "written" consent can be given by board members separately in email.) Additionally, SB 563 appears to prohibit a majority of the board from even discussing "any item of business that is within the authority of the board" via email unless it qualifies as a bona fide emergency.

SB563 amends several sections of Davis-Stirling Common Interest Development Act, including the "Common Interest Development Open Meeting Act" (Civil Code 1363.05 - the "act." The Act has been specifically revised to state "the board of directors shall not take action on any item of business outside of a meeting." [new Civil code 1363.05(j)(1)] Directors are expressly prohibited from conducting a meeting via a series of emails except for an emergency meeting if all of the board members consent in writing (either individually or collectively.) and the written consent(s) must be filed with the board minutes. Written consent to conduct the emergency meeting may be transmitted electronically.

SB563 also makes significant changes in the definition of board meeting. The Act, until December 31, 2011, defines a meeting as "any congregation of a

majority of the members of the board at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item of business scheduled to be heard by the board, except those matters that may be discussed in executive session." Thus, it was okay to discuss the issue outside a board meeting (including by email) if it was not on the board agenda (i.e. scheduled) or it was a matter that could be considered in executive session (e.g. litigation, contracts, member discipline, personnel. member's payments assessments.)

After January 1, 2012, the definition of a meeting has been expanded to include any congregation of a majority of the members of the board at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item of business that is with the authority of the board. Under the new law, there is no exception for executive sessions, which are now included in the definition of board "meeting." Additionally, the requirement that the item must be "scheduled to be heard by the board" has been dropped. The issue need only be within the board's decisionmaking authority, which, in contract to "any item of business scheduled to be heard by the board," has a massive scope.

With the passage of SB563, we will advise boards and managers of our HOA clients that the board cannot take action by email except in an emergency. It is not crystal clear that email discussion by a majority of the board is prohibited by the new statute because "action" is not defined. However, we surmise the intent of the statute was to eliminate email discussions among board members. As a result, our advice will be that if a majority of the directors discusses "any item of business that is within the authority of the board" through email, they will be taking a risk if the issue does not qualify as an emergency.

The Act already defines emergency as "circumstances that could not have been reasonable foreseen which require immediate attention and possible action by the board, and which of necessity make it impracticable to provide notice as required by this section." There can be conflicting opinions about whether a particular situation is an "emergency." In case of a challenging member's lawsuit, board action via email that is contrary to the restrictions imposed by SB 563 can be the basis for a court finding that the board violated the Open Meeting Act. This could subject the association to a "civil penalty" of up to \$500 per violation and a requirement that the association pay the challenging member's attorney's fees and court costs. For the above reasons, boards should be extremely cautious about taking action via email and consult with legal counsel before deciding they are justified in doing so due to an emergency.

Corporations Code Section 7211(b) permits the board of a California nonprofit mutual benefit corporation (which most HOAs are) to take any action that is required or permitted to be taken by unanimous written consent of the board. The unanimous written consent is board action "outside of a meeting." But SB 563 states that "the board of directors shall not take action on any item of business outside of a meeting" but allows an "emergency meeting" via email with unanimous written consent of all board members.

While SB 563 does not expressly override Corporations Code Section 7211(b), it also does not grant an exception that would allow the use of unanimous written consents as an exception to the broad prohibition on boards taking action outside of a meeting. For those reasons, the safest approach would be for HOA boards to stop using unanimous written consents after January 1, 2012 except in the event

of a legitimate emergency, and to consult with legal counsel before doing so.

With 60 or more members present, the meeting was moved into the large social hall.

Open forum

Michael Bates - stated he was very qualified as a builder, has looked at hundred of setbacks and he stated a member had built something without the proper setback and he felt Diana Cook had tried to circumvent our rules and procedures to assist а friend bv requesting our new manager approve a set of plans. In Michael's opinion, the decision was not based on fairness, but on friendship.

Mark Zevanove - Welcomed new manager, and discussed the board firing of Pat McDonald. She was knowledgeable and it was too bad she was fired.

Robert Wunce – trust has been broken **Gayle Logan Silva** – speak on subjects tonight and not waste time today

John Mancini -termination of McDonald. If there was an agreement to terminate her in six months, why was there no search for a bookkeeper? Why was no notice given? properties in the Park. Moved by Sharon to purchase the coverage of professional services at a cost of \$3500.00 a year. Motion carried.

ERT – Three 911 calls and Ray is looking for CERT training

Budget – asked for changes to the budget...changes approved.

Dog Park – Cheryl Dangreau - 150' length of dog park. Park liability? As long as rules are posted there is no problem with liability and the dog park. Received two bids..one for \$10,000 and one for \$20,000. Predicts the cost will be around \$5,000.00 Motion to approve the expenditure passed.

8.0 Accounts Receivable Policy – was adopted unanimously.

Water Project Town Hall meeting is scheduled for April 21.

Car Sticker & Vehicle Sticker Policy – need to table as some items need to be addressed. Board is looking at vehicles with expired registration to be removed. Vehicles without licenses need to be garaged.

Medical Release form – our volunteers are already covered

Ad Hoc Committee needs to be created to investigate discrepancy in our current books. Motion passed.

Anonymous letters – will be discussed this evening.
